Jim helped make the decision to use ATV's for our field work. He tried the first one, a three-wheeler, which he managed to turn over three times


on a hilly field in southern Illinois. However, he somehow proved his point and we purchased two ATV's, four wheelers instead of three wheelers.

As the company continued to grow, he was needed to take care of our trucks, ATV's, lab equipment and anything else that needed fixing.

We told him he can now sit down and write that book we all talked about writing when we retire. We miss him already, but wish nothing but the best for him. Now he has time to do those "round to it" jobs that he has promised himself for years while working for Pro-Ag.

- * pH testing is for hydrogen ions - not limestone.
- * Phosphate Fertilizer - moves only 3cm from where it is placed in the soil. It is moved only with tillage.
- * Potash leaches downward in the soil - going as much as 6' down into the soil structure.
- * Anhydrous Ammonia Conversion leaves 4 units of Hydrogen for each unit of Nitrogen. Hydrogen turns soil acid.
- * Fulvic Acid speeds up conversion of inorganic minerals to organic - aiding the uptake of these nutrients to increase corn and bean yields.
- * Nitrogen moves with the soil water table - up, down and sideways
- * We need a dry month of May for a record corn crop yield.
- * It takes 5000 gallon of water to make one bushel of corn.
- * It takes 13,000 gallons of water to make one bushel of beans. Aug/Sept. rains are so vital to bean yields.

Blake Pearson, Mt.Carmel, IL


